Our editorial team independently fact-check articles using both sources provided by our authors and broader contextual research. Our team has experience spanning each of our four focus points (short <u>bios</u> of our editorial team are published on our site).

We are independent from political influence

We have received support from <u>Open Philanthropy</u> and <u>Emergent Ventures</u>. Neither Open Philanthropy nor Emergent Ventures have any editorial control over what we publish. They do not review, approve, or suggest content. Their support is offered with no strings attached.

We also ask our authors to declare conflicts of interest prior to the publication of their pieces. Where a material conflict of interest exists, we disclose it alongside the article.

We strive to bring a balanced perspective

We strive for a balanced representation of voices within our publication. With this in mind, we actively track the demographics of both our pipeline and articles that are published. Our open <u>pitch</u> process provides authors who may have been overlooked in our standard commissioning process an opportunity to have their voices heard.
